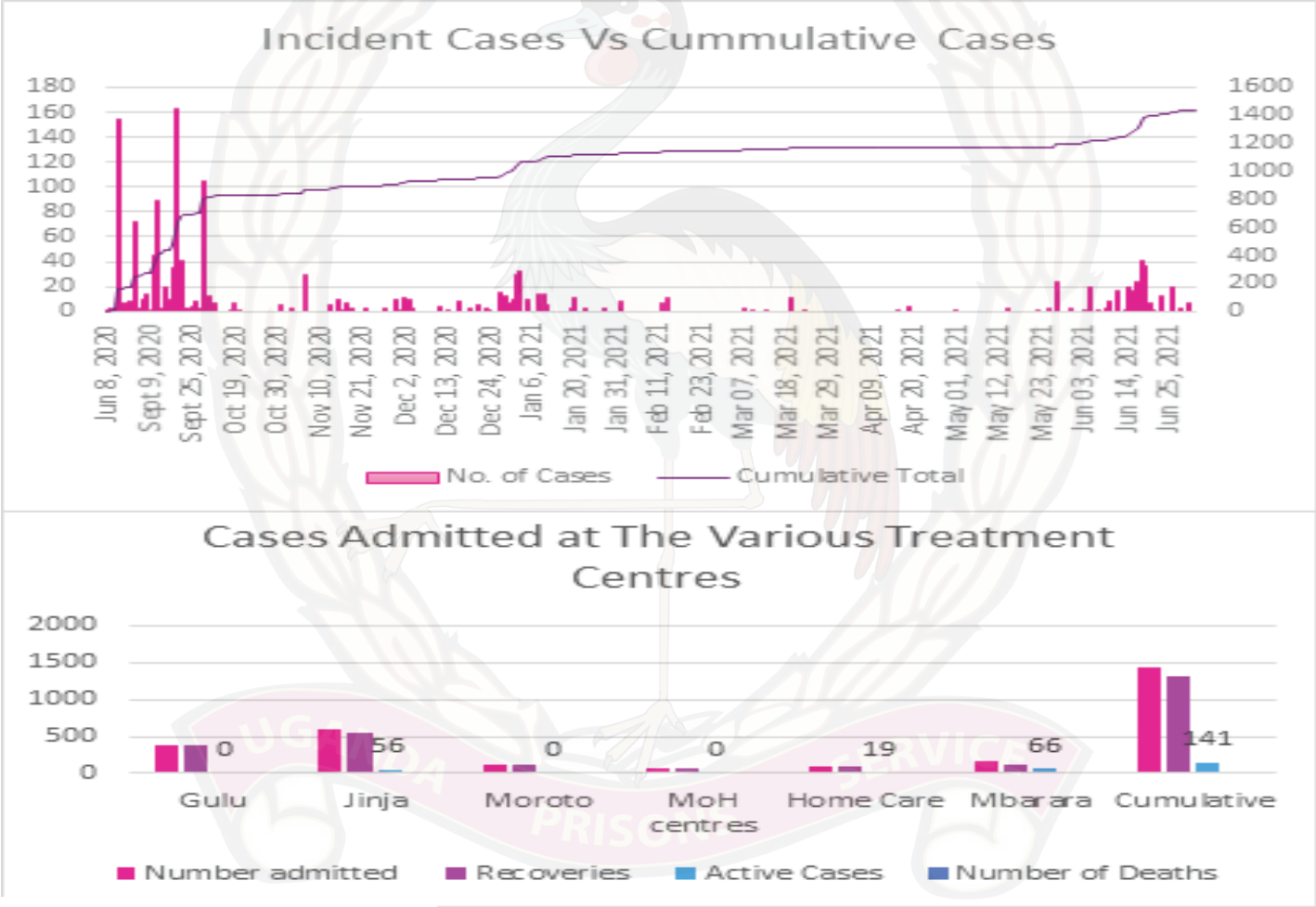
COVID-19 SITUATION IN UGANDA PRISONS SERVICE.

Since the declaration of the first lockdown on 20th March 2020. The Commissioner general of Prisons instituted a National Task Force to spear head preparedness for early detection and response to COVID-19 in the Uganda Prisons Service.

The cumulative total number of cases of COVID-19 reported at UPS to date is 1,438 (1,289 prisoners, 117 staff and 31 relatives to staff) with 1,301 recoveries, 141 active cases and 2 deaths to date.

Chronology of COVID-19 in UPS

First recorded case on 4th May 2020: 01 prisoner at U.G Prison Kaiti reception centre in Namutumba district.

COVID-19 SITUATION ANALYSIS
(9th July, 2021)

Back Ground

Since the declaration of the 1st case of COVID-19 in China on 31st December, 2019, Uganda started preparations for early detection and prevention of the pandemic. On 21st March, 2020 Uganda reported the 1st case of COVID-19 in the country and the CGP instituted a National Task Force to spear head preparations for early detection and response in Uganda Prisons Service.

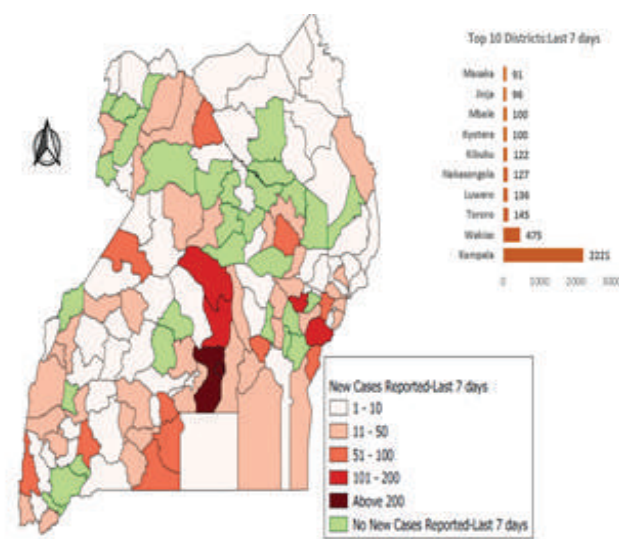
At the national level.

A reduction in PCR COVID-19 cases observed with a daily average of 732 cases in the last 7 days compared to a daily average of 861 in the previous 7 days.

Kampala District still reporting the highest number of cases in a day ranging between 200-500 cases since 28th June 2021; followed by Wakiso District averaging between 40-90 cases.

Other high transmission districts include; Nakasongola; Kanungu; Tororo; Kibuku; Buikwe; Kalungu; Hoima; and Mbale.

Uganda COVID-19 nation wide prevalence



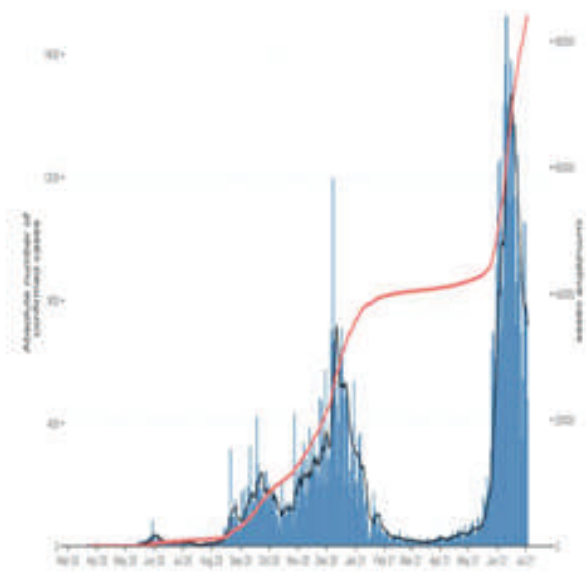
Cumulative number of COVID-19 cases stands at 84,555 from 136/136 districts.

Average PCR positivity rate stands at 11.8% in the last 7 days compared to 12.2% of the previous days.

Cumulative deaths stand at 1,995 with; Twenty-nine deaths (29) on 4th July 2021 and; Twenty-seven (27) deaths on 3rd July 2021; Twenty-nine (29) on 2nd July 2021; Thirty-seven (37) on 1st July 2021; Fifty (50) deaths on (30th June 2021); Thirty-eight (38) deaths on (29th June 2021); Thirty-four (34) deaths on (28th June 2021) and (746) probable deaths accumulated over the past days.

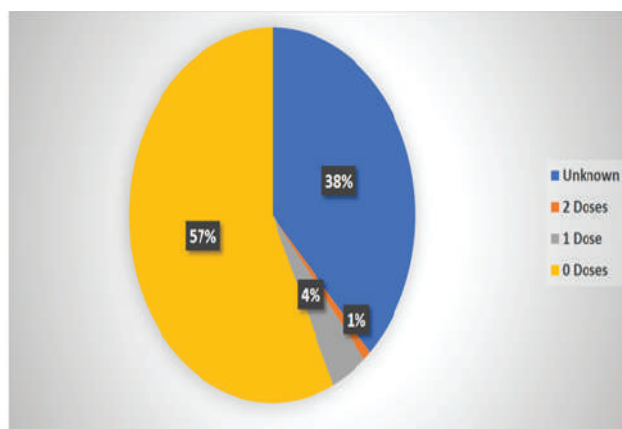
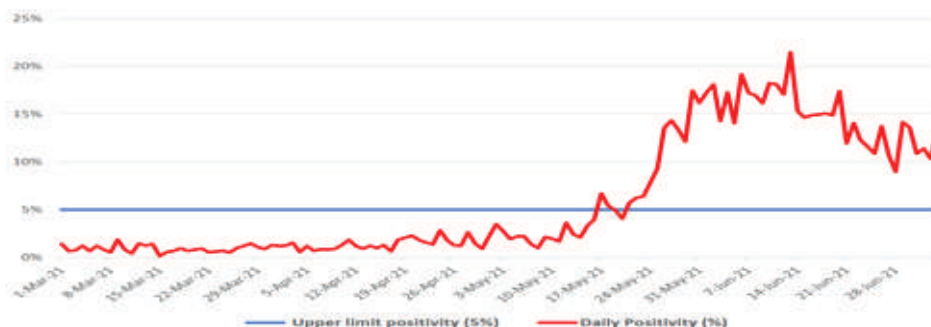
Probable deaths will be included to daily COVID-19 deaths reported based on the +clinical diagnostic criteria for suspected COVID-19 deaths with no PCR or Antigen Rapid Diagnostic Test (AgRDT) result; or with a negative test result but with clinical picture similar to COVID19, Case Fatality Rate currently stands at 2.4%.

A total of 1,068 cases on active admission today. Of these, 100 (9%) are in Intensive care Unit (ICU) while 438 (41%) are in High Dependency Unit (HDU). Fifty-four (54) facility discharges have been reported today.

Coordination

The National Prisons Task Force continues to coordinate response activities around the country. The weekly regional TASK Force coordination meeting continue to take place every week virtually.

The high lights of the regional meeting include;

- All regions have established Village Task Force committees reporting to OC's
- Treatment centres are experiencing shortage of drugs.
- Some facilities like Kaabong, Kotido, Amita, Paidha and Adjumani had all their staff receive their 2nd dose vaccinations from the community.
- Gulu and Lira do not have transport and the Lorry of Masaka is overdue for service.
- The infrastructure of the reception centres in North western region need re-enforcement as prisoners are threatening to break out.
- A number of prison facilities have improvised and made masks out of old prisoners' clothing. Facilities need materials and threads to continue providing cloth masks for prisoners and staff.
- Supplies for Mbale, Soroti, Moroto, Lira and Fort portal that are still in the store will be delivered through this week end.

Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) High Lights

There was a total of 140 new cases of COVID-19 during the course of this week including 135 prisoners and 5 staff.

The cumulative total number of cases of COVID-19 reported at UPS to date is 1,598 (1,444 prisoners, 122 staff and 31 relatives) with 1,360 recoveries, 241 active cases and 4 deaths.

Vaccines amounting to 2,000 doses have been allocated to UPS for the vaccination of prisoners aged 50 years and above and those below 50 years but with underlying medical conditions.

Members of the Prisons Task Force met and discussed the process of collapsing Kampala remand to pave way for creation of a COVID-19 Auxiliary Isolation Centre (AIC) for prisoners at the greater central region.

A CAMPAIGN VS. COVID-19 AMONG PRISONS COMMUNITIES: KAMPALA EXTRA REGION FOCUS (A): LUZIRA HILL COMMUNITY.

With the second Covid-19 wave hitting the country, Luzira Prisons barracks community Covid-19 taskforce has intensified its efforts in combatting the deadly disease.

The Officers in charge of Safety and Security Unit, Superintendent of Prisons Kwihangana Jackson and Barracks and security, Assistant Superintendent of Prisons Amos Alinaitwe together with the barracks village chairpersons and Village health teams who composed the Covid-19 taskforce held a meeting on 19th June 2021 where they agreed to re-enforce the Presidential directives, Ministry of Health regulations, Commissioner General of Prisons' Administrative Instructions on the current resurgence of the COVID-19 Pandemic with the following agreed upon:

- 1- Every household must have hand washing area for use by every member of each family.
- 2- All members of the community must mandatorily wear face masks whenever they are leaving their respective households.
- 3- Unauthorized visitations into the Barracks has been stopped.
- 4- Members of the community must report any new or un authorized persons sighted in the Barracks to relevant authorities for further management and investigations.
- 5- Movements of children have been restricted within the barracks.
- 6- All sporting activities within the Barracks have been suspended henceforth play grounds are hereby declared out of use until further notices

Sensitization tours are being periodically carried out by the Covid-19 taskforce of Luzira as well as checking for community compliance to the measures setup to mitigate the spread of the pandemic.



Mr. Drani John, the Chairperson of the COVID-19 task force said that his team is doing all it takes to ensure that Luzira Prisons Barracks is 100% Corona free. "We are currently embarking on necessary follow ups, regular community policing and monitoring at the grass root level to instill compliance to COVID-19 Standard Operating Procedures (S.O.Ps) within the barracks".

FOCUS(B) KIGO COMMUNITY.



On a positive note, the Officer in Charge Kigo Main prison - Senior Supritendant of Prisons Naimuli Robert handed over negative test results to 03 barracks community members who were discharged from the Kigo Prison health Center / clinic after undergoing treatment for 14 days in the presence of the medical team.

EU AND PENAL REFORM INTERNATIONAL DONATE TO PRISONS

European Union and Uganda Prisons Service have continued to build a strong stakeholders base in a bid to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 pandemic within the Prisons community by closely partnering with European Union and Penal Reform International.

This was during a hand over of an assortment of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), sanitizers, face masks, soap, detergents and educational materials that will benefit both staff and prisoners as they protect themselves against the COVID-19 pandemic sweeping the World at their offices on 1st July 2021 in addition to other donations made to Nakasongola prison, Masaka Main prison and Masaka Ssaza prison.

Doreen Namyalo Kyazze, the Executive Director Penal Reform International in Uganda said, "We believe that when the risks of infection increases within the community, the situation is even more worse in a correctional facility because of the vulnerable nature of the environment within which they live".



The Commissioner General of Prisons, in a tweet thanked Penal Reform International for the invaluable and generous offer to Uganda Prisons Service.

Noting that the strategy the Service had adopted is for staff not to transmit COVID to inmates. The return of pupils and students from schools has also shattered the reception centre strategy.

Commissioner of Prisons (Health Services) Mr. Tumwebaze John Bosco appreciated all the efforts made by stakeholders in the collective fight against COVID-19 with the Uganda Prisons Service.

LIFE SKILLS TRAINING IN PRISONS: AS A MODEL OF REHABILITATION

KAMPALA REMAND PRISONS

Life Skills Trainings have been established in Prisons to help our inmates who are due for release to cope with the community and world they are going into through guidance, in order to avoid recidivism.

The program guides them back to the community with skills in their households which have enabled them make better decisions, controlled their anger, and chose better friends.

Life skills is one of the ways rehabilitation officers in prisons reintegrate and resettle inmates after completion of their sentences, through counselling and guidance inmates are able to open up about their challenges home.

Some of the inmates through the business model course unit have gained skills they have gone ahead to start up business and now have projects running both in animal keeping, vegetable/flower management & mushroom growing. They're so many more testimonies that my former prisoners have gained from life skills and we really appreciate the Commissioner General's contribution and initiative.

The purpose is to handle and train inmates on their physical and psychological issues/needs, on how to deal with decision making, anger management, managing emotions, problem solving, peer pressure, business plan and other skills to help them survive in the community after release hence controlling recidivism rates and crime.

The overall objectives of Life skilling is to:

- To train inmates in life skills and how to deal with different scenarios in life including coping mechanism.
- To educate inmates on life after prison and how to go about it in order to avoid crime and relapses.
- To share experiences with other prisoners like those who have serving long sentence and even former prisoners to come and share their experience after prison
- To design and propose interventions that can help meet the inmates identified needs.

Over 400 inmates benefit from the Life Skilling Trainings annually which knowledge gained has helped them live better lives on the outside reducing on recidivism in prisons.

A DRIVE INTO STAFF WELFARE THROUGH EMPOWERING STAFF SPOUSES IN BAKING

Earlier this year, the Commissioner General of Prisons, Can. Dr. Johnson Byabashaija commissioned Staff Spouse Bakery at Luzira Prisons Complex called Superior Bakery which is a Government initiative under the Office of the Prime Minister aiming to empower staff spouses of the Armed Forces of Uganda by Providing programs /projects intended to boost the welfare and individual income of spouses.

Since it's initial establishment, the Bakery embarked on small scale production of consumable products like Cakes, Bread, Mandazi, Buns, Doughnuts, Daddies among others which has readily met the ever-growing demand within Luzira through timely deliveries with in the community who have positively preferred to consume from Superior Bakery.

Despite challenges of stiff competitions, the administrator at Superior Bakery Mrs. Akirapa Diana Martha (Senior Rehabilitation and Reintegration Officer) expresses the need for expanding the capacity of the Bakery into a middle scale production status which will see the bakery grow into the already exiting market. Strategically, the Bakery plans on acquiring a delivery van and opening operational outlets within other areas of Kampala so as to enhance marketing and distribution of their products. She calls upon other willing individuals and stakeholders to come in and support the project which has greatly improved the livelihood of staff spouses within Luzira Baracks Community, it has offered a daily income earning opportunity to them.

The superior staff spouses bakery at Luzira is a pilot project intended to be rolled out to other region within the prisons fraternity.

UPS HIT HARD BY DROUGHT IN SEASON 2021 A (JANUARY - JUNE)

Under the Seed Multiplication project, Uganda Prisons Service planted over 1,300 acres in the first season A this year including different Maize, Sunflower and Soya Bean seed varieties in general. But unfortunately, 303 Acres were terribly affected by drought causing damage to the crop quality, Increased pest infestation and Crop diseases due to delayed ploughing and planting because of the hard pans which causes poor seed germination hence reduced or no crop yields.

Secondly, Cotton Production commenced in March-2021 with ploughing and seed planting but the exercise was halted towards the end of April due to early onset of drought throughout the Country which lasted for almost one and a half months affecting the crop yielding on 1,046 Acres.

However, Cotton being a drought tolerant crop compared to maize and sunflower, the one that had germinated was not significantly affected by drought and is responding positively with the resumption of rains. It is believed that if rain stabilizes, the earlier targeted 5,615 acres will be successfully achieved, with an expected output of 2,807,500 kgs (5,615 bales) of seed cotton at an average of 500kgs per acre.

UPS DELIVERS ON PRESIDENTIAL DIRECTIVE, MAIZE SEED MULTIPLCATION

Uganda Prisons Service has become a key player in the Seed sector value chain in Uganda playing significant role in the development and maintenance of seed varieties, seed production and processing, packaging and marketing as its primary target, the aim is to address the challenges of inadequate supply and limited access to quality maize seed.

The Prisons farms has maintained close linkages with partners such as Ministry of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry and Fisheries in acquisition of new hybrid during monitoring, certification, early seed generation and commercialization processes.



UPS is currently producing and promoting high yielding seed varieties like Longe 5D OPV which is drought tolerant, High breed UH 5051 and three way High breed 5355 with a cumulative yielding capacity between 25-39 bags per acre. The overall germination rate of all this varieties is between 95%-98%. Longe 5D OPV variety produces bigger cobs with a stronger stem usually preferred by livestock farmers as source of forage while High breed UH 5051 and 5355 are the best yielding varieties.

Additionally, UPS has established demonstration farms in Rwimi, Amita and Kitalya Prisons Farms as a way to showcase the performance of its stress resilient Maize Seed Varieties, Seed Multiplication and sustain the demand for it's seeds.

INMATES EXCEL IN PLE 2020

Primary Leaving Examination results were officially released on the 16th July 2021 by Minister for Education and sports Hon. Janet Kataha Museveni and among the jubilant of excellence are the inmates at Upper Maximum Prisons, Luzira.

The atmosphere was different at the prisons facility as a community of Prisoners got into celebratory moods as soon as the results started trickling in. The results were good enough with 5 passing in division one, 23 in the second division and 11 in division three among the students who sat early this year.

Immediately the results were released, excitement was written all over faces of inmates who sat the Examinations, the best performing students, were smiling from ear to ear with joy upon receiving the results. Luckily, Tushabe Abbey emerged as the best scoring 9 aggregates (English-3, Science-3, SST-2 and MTC-1), Kalema Brain emerged second best with 10 aggregates (English-3, Science-3, SST-2, MTC-2), Masaba Muntu coming third on 11 aggregates (English-3, Science-3, SST-3 and MTC-3) meanwhile Babirye Anita of Luzira Women Prison becoming the best female candidate scoring 12 aggregates (English-5, Science-2, SST-2 and MTC-3).

While commenting on the performance of the candidates, ACP Sentalo Moses, Officer in Charge Upper Prison says it is always a concerted efforts involving inmates into commitments to studying as a rehabilitation strategy, they exhibit a lot of discipline, dedication and hard work in order to achieve academically, we expect better performances in subsequent sittings.

When asked in chorus, the prisoners said, "We want to thank the prisons administration especially the OC and his team, the school management who have enabled us pass with flying colors, we also want to thank God for the good health and wisdom of passing examinations".
