OUTBREAK OF RED EYES IN PRISONS.

The Ministry of Health (MOH) has announced the outbreak of red eyes in various parts of the country, including Uganda Prison facilities. The Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) wishes to inform the public about the situation and the measures being taken.

So far, about 1,000 cases have been registered by the UPS Health Department, and 90 percent of the victims have already recovered. The affected Prison Units include Kampala Remand Prison, Upper Maximum-Security Prison, Pader Prison, Murchison Bay Prison, Kaweeri Prison, Lira Main Prison, Luzira Women Prison and Erute Prison.

To control the infection and ensure the safety of inmates and staff, the following measures have been put in place:

1. The transfer of prisoners to or from the infected prison units has been suspended until the outbreak is brought under control.
2. Mandatory screening of prisoners upon admission is implemented at all prison facilities.
3. Collaboration with the Police and MOH for screening of suspects while in custody is ongoing.
4. Strict adherence to established Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) is in practice.
5. Visitations are conducted under strict rules and regulations.
6. Isolation and treatment of identified cases are done.
7. All Regional Prisons Commanders (RPC's), District Prisons Commanders (DPC's), and Officers in Charge (OC's) have been instructed to ensure strict compliance with these measures to mitigate the impact of the outbreak.

Note: Suspected cases of red eyes must be reported promptly to the prison health team through designated contact numbers: **0752680801, 0783012964** and **0772927164**.

The Commissioner General of Prisons emphasizes the importance of vigilance in safeguarding the health and well-being of inmates, staff, and the public.

PRESS BRIEFING

RESPONSE TO RED EYES DISEASE IN UGANDA PRISONS

MONDAY, APRIL 8th 2024

1. **Establishment:** Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) currently has a staff strength of 14,247, stationed in 269 Prison Units and grouped in 19 administrative regions. In custody, there are 76,817 inmates, including 40,796 convicts, 35,456 remands, 565 debtors; and 258 children incarcerated with their mothers.

2. **Easter Celebrations:** The Commissioner General of Prisons commends the UPS fraternity for the successful celebrations in the just concluded Easter festival. He is looking forward to a colourful EID Day.

3. **Update on Red Eyes Disease:** Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) has registered 5,905 cases of red eyes disease. Of these 4,704 cases have fully recovered and only 1,202 active cases remain. Fortunately, there are neither deaths nor critical cases registered.

The affected Prison Units include: Upper Prison, Murchison Bay, Kampala Remand, Luzira Women, Kasanda, Kagadi, Kamuli, Lira Women, Erute, Kigo Main, Lira Main, Gulu Main, Jinja Main, Mbarara Main, Isingiro, Butuntumula, Nakasongola, Ngoma, Kauga, Bamunanika, Sentema, Kiyunga, Ntenjeru and Kitalya Mini Max prisons.

Strict adherence to Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) remains in place to manage the situation effectively.

Equally so, the public is advised to refrain from visiting Prisons if unwell and **MUST** follow UPS guidelines for visitation at courts and stations.

4. **Recruitment Hoax Alert:** The Public is hereby informed that UPS is **not** conducting any staff recruitment exercise. Therefore, no one should fall for scams that promise employment within UPS at different levels.

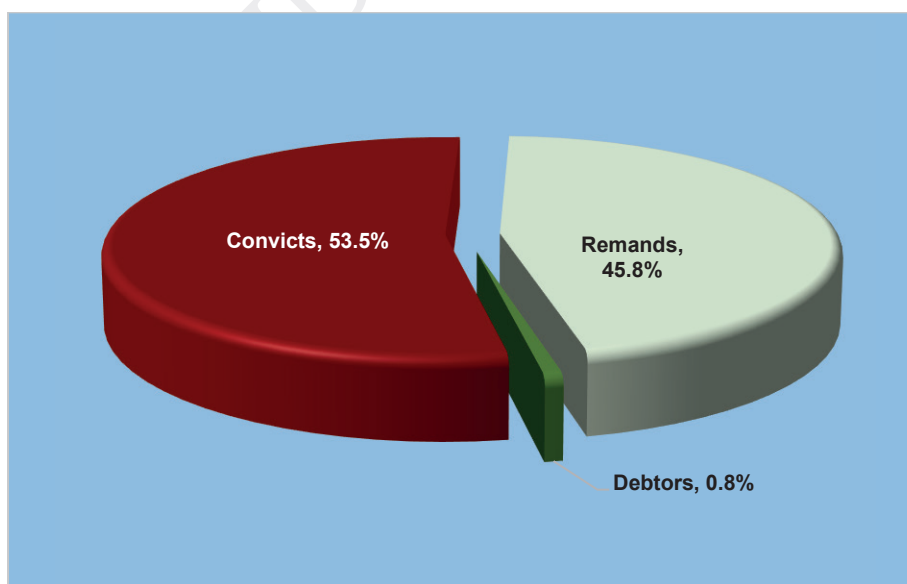


Figure 1: *Composition of Prisons population*

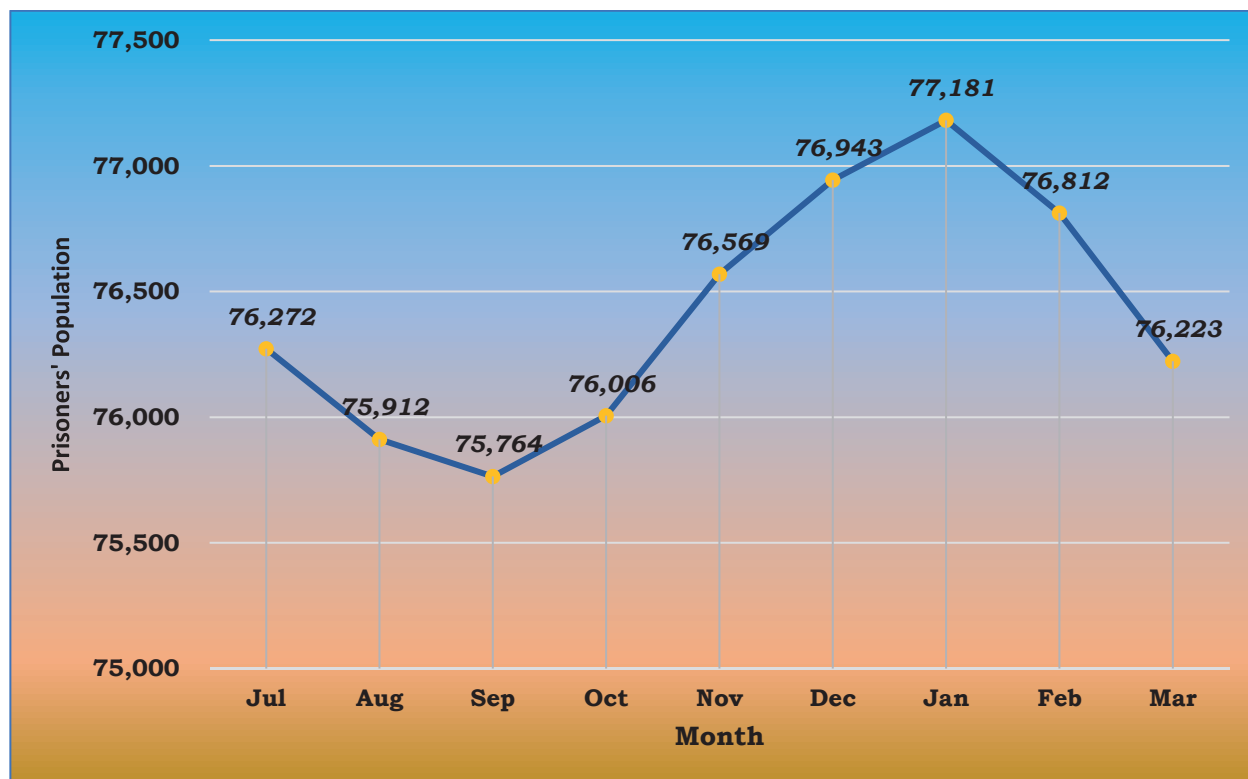


Figure 2: *Trend of prisoners' population growth for the period between July, 2023 and March, 2024.*

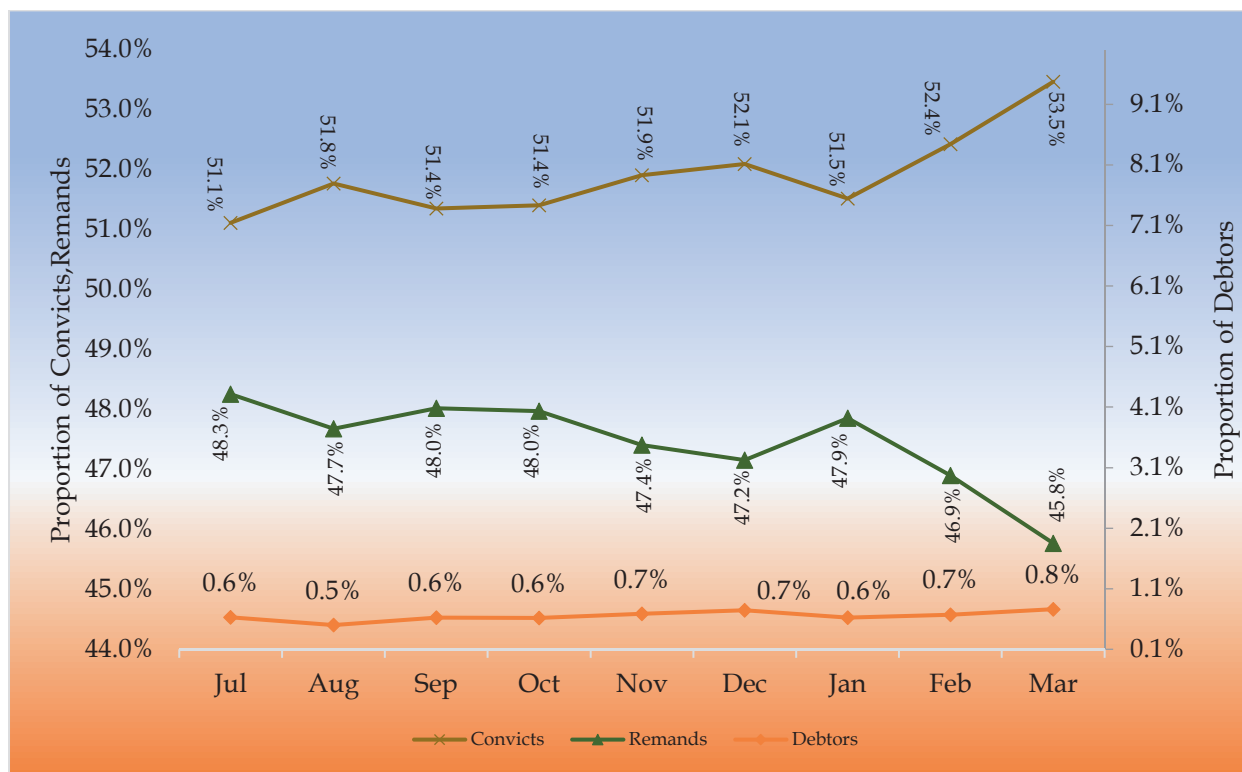


Figure 3: Monthly composition trends of convicts, remands, and debtors.

President Yoweri Museveni of Uganda delivered a stirring address at the International Women's Day 2024 celebrations in Katakwi District, emphasizing economic empowerment and gender equality as cornerstones of national progress. Speaking to a diverse audience at the Boma Grounds, President Museveni articulated a vision of shared prosperity and opportunities, stressing the pivotal role of women in driving economic growth and social development.

Central to President Museveni's message was the imperative of leveraging Uganda's natural resources, particularly land, for commercial agriculture and economic empowerment. He championed initiatives such as "ekibaaro" (calculation) as catalysts for household development, highlighting their potential to uplift communities and eliminate barriers faced by women.

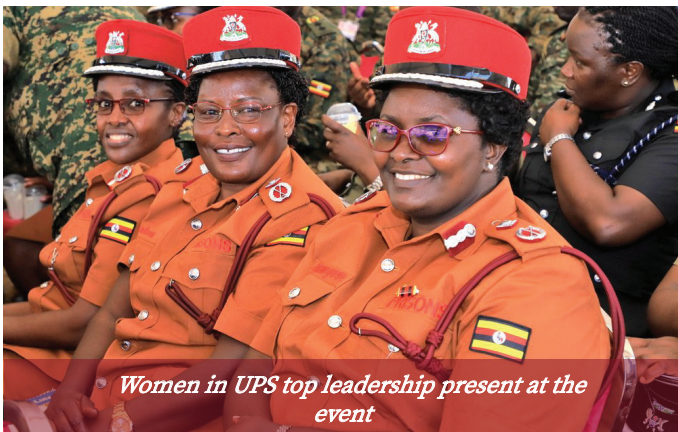

NO MORE PRISON STAFF ACCOMMODATION SHORTAGE

On a working visit to UG. PREVENTION OF VIOLENT EXTREMISM AND PROMOTION OF HUMAN RIGHTS KEY TO SUCCESS OF UPS

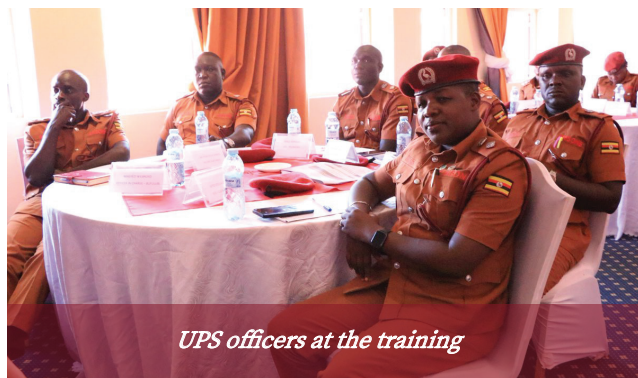


The Prevention of Violent extremism and promotion of human rights training in progress.

In a bid to enhance the knowledge and skills of prisons officials, the Uganda Prisons Service has teamed up with the Uganda Human Rights Commission (UHRC) and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) to provide training on Human Rights best practices and Preventing Violent Extremism (PCVE). The training, which brought together officers from various prisons across the country, aimed to assess prisons' compliance with the Mandela Rules in prison management. The Assistant Commissioner General of Prisons, Mr. Milton Tiyo, appreciated the organizers for the initiative, emphasizing the need for enhanced collaboration with other justice actors and continuous training of staff in Human Rights standards.

By empowering prisons officials with the knowledge and skills to assess and address Human Rights concerns, the country takes a significant step towards promoting justice and preventing violent extremism.

CAPACITY BUILDING: PRISONS INTERMEDIATE COMMAND AND STAFF COURSE



Mr. Moses Kafeero Kabugo, Senior Commissioner of Police (Commandant – Police Senior Command & Staff College – Bwebajja), conducted a lecture on Critical Incident Command tailored for Prisons Officers undergoing the Intermediate Command and Staff course at the Prisons Academy and Training School (PATS) in Luzira. The session was aimed to equip them with essential knowledge and strategies for managing critical situations effectively.

SCP Kafeero's lecture centered on an exploration of critical incidents, emphasizing the importance of understanding incident stages, defining security responsibilities, and refining command and control strategies. The participants were enlightened on various examples of critical incidents, ranging from fires and accidents to hostage situations, providing them with a broad perspective on potential challenges they may encounter in their line of duty.

Throughout the discussion, he highlighted the significance of proactive leadership, urging officers to assume temporary command when necessary, swiftly assess situations, and prioritize the safety of

responders. His emphasis on decisive action and rapid evaluation resonated with the officers, who recognized the role of effective crisis management in ensuring public safety and security.

SCP Kafeero highlighted the imperative of timely inter-agency collaborations in emergency response efforts. Stressing the need for coordinated personnel and equipment availability, he advocated for services to be limited to areas where officers are fully trained, aligning resources with the nature of the incident at hand. This strategic approach, he noted, is essential for optimizing response efficiency and mitigating potential risks.

The lecture concluded with a call to action for Prisons Officers to apply the insights gained in their day-to-day operations, reaffirming their commitment to safeguarding communities and upholding law and order. His invaluable contribution to enhancing the professional capabilities of law enforcement personnel was met with appreciation and gratitude from participants, who departed with newfound knowledge and determination to excel in their future roles.

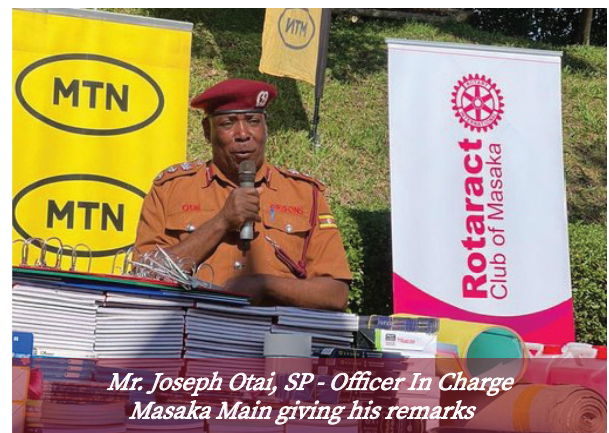


MTN and Rotaract donating scholastic and support items to UPS Masaka Main Prison

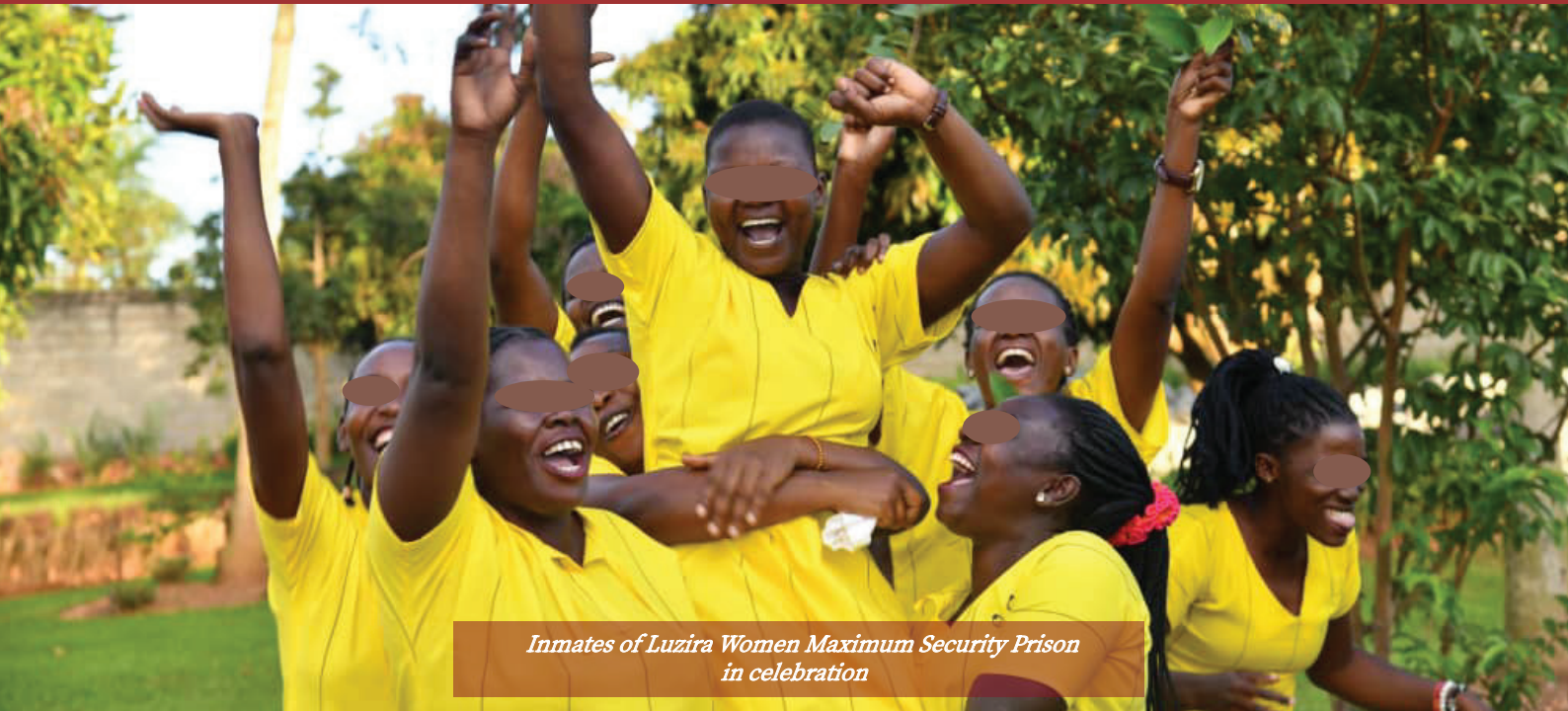

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION AND PRODUCTIVITY IN UPS

SEED MAIZE PRODUCTION

In a strategic move towards agricultural self sufficiency and enhanced food security, the Prisons Farms Department embraced seed maize production in 2016 as a delegated mandate from H.E the President of Uganda. This initiative not only tackles the challenge of adulterated seeds but also plays a vital role in fortifying the nation's overall food security by providing high quality certified maize seed to farmers at affordable prices. In this Financial year 2022/2023 a total of 1,430.7MT of certified maize seed and 67.5 MT of foundation seed were produced.

Seed maize producing farms namely; U.G Prisons Farms Ruimi for Hybrid seed, Amita for OPV longe 5D which is enriched with protein, Kitanya, Orom-Tikau, Ragem, Bulaula, Loro and Mubuku, for bulking parent lines. The quality of Prisons seed has earned acclaim, boasting an impressive performance score of 99% purity and 95% germination after laboratory tests at National Agricultural Research Laboratory Kawanda.

Prisons maize seed touching Farmers lives on the account of its 99.9% purity and 95% germination. The seed enterprise directly contributes to Prisons' self-sufficiency, supplying 100% of the certified maize seed requirement for maize grain production across all prison farms. Beyond intrinsic benefits, it addresses market challenges of adulterated and overpriced seeds, reducing middlemen influence. Financially impactful, the Seed Maize Enterprise targets a substantial Non-Tax Revenue (NTR) of 5 Billion Ugandan Shillings annually. During the review period, 115 metric tons of certified seed, valued at UGX 690 Million, were distributed and planted across Prison farms, emphasizing its economic significance and pivotal role in sustaining the agricultural ecosystem within Prison facilities.

Seed Maize Production Trend

In FY 2021/22, 1,202 acres yielded 1,112.1 MTs, while FY 2022/23 saw remarkable growth, with 1613.5 acres producing 1,430.7 MT. Acreage increased by an impressive 34.5%, and output grew by about 28.5%, highlighting Prisons Farms' resilience and dynamism in seed multiplication.

Seed processing and treatment

Simple seed treatment equipment was procured to help in having our seed processed, treated, and bagged ourselves to avoid adulterations by third parties. All the units have been supplied save for the dryer whose delivery is ongoing.

Karamoja OPM Program

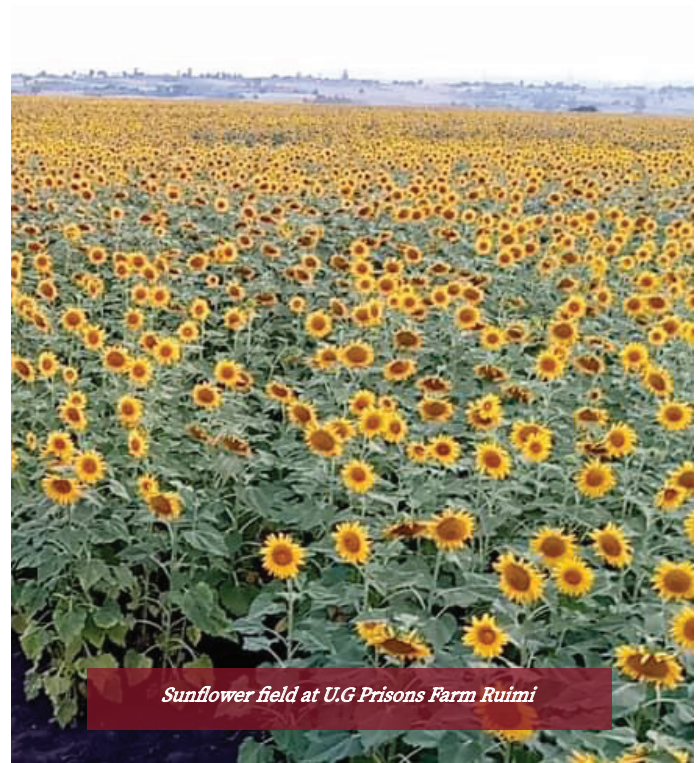
This is run with assistance from Office of the Prime Minister under the Karamoja school children feeding program and food security, implemented at U.G Prisons Farm Namalu.

Farms Department actively participates in special assignments implemented at Namalu Prisons Farm. This program, focuses on production of maize grain for school children in Karamoja sub region to contribute to regional food security concerns. Namalu Prisons Farm stands as a key contributor to the success of this initiative, exemplifying the department's dedication to community welfare beyond traditional farming roles. A total of 500 acres have been assigned to this cause with output of about 500MT of maize.

SUNFLOWER

Sunflower takes center stage in the oil crops initiative, notably as a cover crop, aiding in breaking the pests and disease cycles affecting other crops. Operating on a contractual basis, Mukwano Industries provides sunflower seeds to Uganda Prisons.

During the reporting period, there was a 55.7% improvement in planted acreage, with 895 acres compared to the previous year, 2022, which had 575 acres. The output also saw a 13% increase, reaching 278,082 kgs, compared to the 246,065 kgs harvested in 2022. Harvested sunflower seeds serve as raw materials for diverse products, creating a symbiotic relationship that has cultivated success. Beyond contractual commitments, sunflower has proven itself as a significant revenue-generating crop for Prisons Farms.

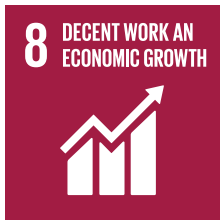

I recently embarked on a professional training course, and the rewards have been nothing short of transformative. Through continuous learning and capacity building, I've witnessed a profound increase in my knowledge and skills relevant to our service.

Each lesson learned has opened new world to me, exposing me to knowledge that I now realise, if I had had earlier, I would have been more efficient and effective in my work.

Our work requires resilience, commitment and passion and I have found not better play to inspire myself and re-commit to my work than through these trainings.

The beauty about these courses is that they make you appreciate different disciplines outside of our traditional knowledge areas and that inter-disciplinary appreciation of issues helps you become a better officer. In a rapidly evolving environment, static knowledge quickly becomes obsolete. To remain relevant and effective in our roles, we must be willing to adapt and grow.

The Uganda Prisons Service is not stagnant; it is evolving, expanding, and demanding more from its officers. We are tasked with the noble responsibility of ensuring the safety, security, and rehabilitation of those within our care. To fulfill this duty with excellence, we must be dedicated, well-trained, and equipped with the latest tools and techniques in corrections.

Yes, there may be uncertainties that accompany stepping away from our duty stations for training. But let us not be paralyzed by fear of the unknown. Instead, let us be guided by the vision of a brighter future, both for ourselves and for the service we proudly represent. To my fellow officers, I urge you: do not let short-term comforts blind you to the long-term opportunities that await. The current forts we hold will soon be taken away by those officers that have been bold to step out of their comfort zone to acquire these trainings.
