




Figure 1: Composition of Prisoners' population




Figure 2: Trend of prisoners' population growth for the period (July 2024 to May 2025)

UGANDA CELEBRATES INTERNATIONAL LABOUR DAY 2025 IN NAKAPIRIPIRIT DISTRICT

The Nakale Playgrounds in Nakapiripirit District came alive as Uganda marked International Labour Day under the theme "Consolidating the Gains of the Parish Development Model (PDM) for Increased Productivity and Inclusive Job Creation." The event, attended by thousands, showcased the nation's commitment to economic progress and workers' rights, with the Uganda Peoples' Defence Forces (UPDF), Uganda Prison Service, and Uganda Police Force playing a prominent role.

he celebrations kicked off in the early morning with the people of Karamoja arriving in their vibrant traditional attire, their colorful beads and intricate patterns reflecting the region's rich cultural heritage. Men donned warrior headgear adorned with feathers, while women wore layered skirts and necklaces that jingled with each step. The air buzzed with excitement as local drummers and dancers performed, setting a festive tone. Invited guests, including diplomats, MPs, and local leaders, joined the growing crowd, mingling with residents and adding to the communal spirit.

As the sun rose higher, the joint parade formation took shape, a disciplined display of coordination between the UPDF, Uganda Police, and Uganda Prison Service. The Prison Service was represented by Deputy Commissioners General, senior officers, and members of the North Eastern region, their crisp uniforms standing out against the dusty backdrop of the playgrounds.

The parade, a highlight of the event, was meticulously organized, with soldiers, police officers, and prison warders aligning in precise rows, ready for the day's proceedings.

The arrival of President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni, the chief guest, marked a pivotal moment. Greeted with enthusiastic cheers, he was welcomed by top government officials, including Deputy Prime Minister Rukia Nakadama, Gender Minister Betty Amongi, Cabinet ministers, and service chiefs from the UPDF, Police, and Prison Service. The President, dressed in his signature attire, acknowledged the crowd with a wave before proceeding to inspect the parade. Accompanied by service chiefs, he walked along the ranks, nodding approvingly at the disciplined formations.

The parade then commenced with a breathtaking display of military precision. The slow march, marked by deliberate and synchronized steps, showcased the professionalism of the forces, while the quick march injected energy, with sharp

movements and rhythmic cadence drawing applause from the crowd. The Uganda Prison Service band stole the show, their brass instruments and drums filling the air with a stirring rendition of patriotic tunes. Spectators described the performance as "spectacular," with the band's melodies blending seamlessly with the disciplined footwork of the parade.

In his keynote address, President Museveni commended the Parish Development Model for its role in boosting rural incomes, citing success stories of small-scale farmers earning sustainable livelihoods. "Uganda now has more jobs in the private sector than in government," he declared, emphasizing the need for smarter land use and value addition to create millions more. He criticized the Ministry of Works for prioritizing new road projects over maintenance, urging, "This must stop. We need balanced infrastructure planning."

The President also called for stronger Pan Africanism to expand regional markets and pledged to review minimum wage policies and curb exploitative recruitment agencies. He condemned cattle rustling in Karamoja, warning that it threatens stability in the region.

Gender Minister Betty Amongi highlighted that 56.7% of Uganda's 25.155 million working-age population are employed, though over 70% remain in informal work. She noted that young people under 30 constitute 73% of the workforce and outlined

plans to formalize jobs through skills training and industrialization. Amongi also announced the deployment of additional labour attachés to the Middle East to protect migrant workers and praised the PDM for reducing subsistence living from 39% to 33%.


Trade union leader John Oketcho lauded the President's focus on workers' rights, while the International Labour Organisation commended Uganda's progressive refugee employment policies. The event culminated with the launch of Uganda's Third Generation Decent Work Country Programme and the awarding of medals to 61 individuals for outstanding service.

The day was a powerful blend of celebration, reflection, and forward-looking policy announcements, with the people of Karamoja, government officials, and security forces uniting to mark a shared vision for Uganda's economic future. As the parade dispersed and the crowds lingered, the spirit of unity and progress lingered in the air, a testament to the nation's resolve to build a more inclusive and prosperous society.

On May 1, 2025, during the International Labour Day celebrations in Nakapiripirit District, His Excellency President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni awarded the prestigious National Independence Diamond Jubilee Medal to five outstanding Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) staff for their exemplary service and unwavering loyalty. The recipients—three medical officers and two senior workshop instructors—were recognized for their significant contributions to healthcare, vocational training, and rehabilitation, aligning with Uganda's national goals of socio-economic transformation.

The ceremony, attended by government officials, local leaders, and community members, highlighted the pivotal role of UPS in fostering development and rehabilitation. The awardees were celebrated for their dedication to improving the lives of inmates, staff, and surrounding communities through their expertise and commitment.



Ms. Juliet Tugume A Beacon of Maternal Care

Ms. Juliet Tugume, an enrolled midwife who joined UPS in 2002, was honored for her 22 years of service across Ndorwa, Kitalya, and Ibuga Prison Farms. Her transformative work in maternal and infant care has significantly enhanced the well-being of female staff, inmates, and nearby communities. Ms. Tugume's exceptional dedication to assisting childbirth and providing postnatal support has earned her widespread admiration and made a lasting impact on prison healthcare.



Ms. Catherine Dawaru Compassionate Healthcare Leader

Ms. Catherine Dawaru, a nursing officer since 2009, was recognized for her compassionate service at Gulu and Arua Main Prisons. Her expertise in antenatal care, first aid, and preventive health education has created safer and healthier environments within the prison system. Ms. Dawaru's ongoing efforts in patient monitoring and hygiene awareness continue to uplift prison communities, reflecting her commitment to improving health-care standards.



Ms. Rhoda Bukanza A Pillar of Disease Control

Ms. Rhoda Bukanza, a senior clinical officer with an impressive 32 years of service at Murchison Bay and Mbale Prisons, was celebrated for her leadership in disease control. Mr. Mukalazi Thomas, a senior tailoring instructor since 1992 at Upper Prison, Luzira, was honored for his innovative approach to uniform production. By adopting contemporary fashion techniques, he modernized tailoring processes, improving the appearance of staff and inmates. Mr. Thomas's training programs have empowered countless individuals with employable skills, contributing to national efforts to promote peace and socio-economic transformation through vocational rehabilitation.





MUSEVENOMICS IN ACTION: UGANDA PRISONS SERVICE'S ROLE IN SOCIOECONOMIC ECONOMIC TRANSFORMATION

The Uganda Prison Service (UPS), a government agency under the Ministry of Internal Affairs, is mandated to contribute to the protection and development of society by providing safe, secure, and humane custody of offenders while prioritizing human rights in its correctional programs. Led by the Commissioner General of Prisons, Can. Dr. Johnson Byabashaija, the UPS has undergone significant transformation since 1986, aligning with Uganda's broader national development strategy.

his period of growth has strengthened its role in enhancing security, rehabilitation, and socioeconomic progress, with the goal of transforming every prisoner into a productive, economically viable, and law-abiding citizen. The UPS workforce has seen remarkable expansion, growing from just 2,000 personnel in 1986 to over 14,000 dedicated staff today.

Infrastructure development has been equally impressive, with the number of prison units increasing from 45 in 1986 to 269 across the country. A standout achievement is the construction of a second maximum-security prison in Kitalya, widely regarded as one of the best in the East and Central African region.

Staff housing has also significantly improved, rising from 10% coverage in 1986 to 75% today, with 6,900 permanent houses countrywide. This progress, largely due to a low-cost housing strategy championed by His Excellency, the President of

Uganda, enhances staff welfare, reduces financial burdens, boosts morale, and promotes operational efficiency.

To further support staff welfare, the Prison SACCO, with 12,880 members, offers savings, loans, and financial literacy training, empowering staff with affordable credit and economic stability for a secure future. Additionally, the Duty-Free Shop service, a government-supported initiative, allows prison staff to purchase essential building materials—such as cement, iron sheets, iron bars, timber, paint, water tanks, and chain links—at reduced prices, free from certain taxes.

The remand prisoner population has decreased from over 65% to below 47% today, reflecting the country's intensified efforts in law enforcement and crime prevention. To support its operations, the Uganda Prison Service's vehicle fleet has grown from just 20 vehicles in 1986 to a modern fleet of 400, including specialized equipment such as 68 tractors, 2 combine harvesters, maize haulers, seed planters,

excavators, and bulldozers.

Rehabilitation is a key pillar of the Uganda Prison Service's mission, with over 50,000 inmates benefiting annually from programs designed to reform and reintegrate them into society. These initiatives include functional adult literacy, formal vocational education, training, religious empowerment, and discipline. Consequently, recidivism rates have substantially decreased from 56.6% in 1986 to 13.4% today, among the lowest globally.

Under the innovative "Musevenomics" initiative, the UPS has revitalized its agricultural program, transforming prisons into productive farming hubs. Annually, the service now produces 12,000 metric tons of maize, 290 metric tons of soybeans, 507 metric tons of sunflower, and 1,800 livestock. This agricultural output supports food security and contributes to Uganda's economic growth.

Storage facilities have undergone an overhaul, transitioning from outdated cribs to modern grain processing and storage facilities, locally known as silos. Located primarily at Lugore Prison Farm in the Northern Region and Ruimi Prison Farm in the Western Region, these silos have a combined capacity of 7,000 metric tons.

The Uganda Prison Service has achieved self-sufficiency in uniform production, manufacturing 100% of the uniforms for both staff


and prisoners, with surplus stock available. These achievements reflect the UPS's commitment to service delivery, access to justice, and national development.

By successfully implementing presidential directives on production from 2016 through the "Buy Uganda Build Uganda" (BUBU) initiative, prison industries have been revitalized, aeneratina substantial economic value. The service produces furniture, liquid soap, craft, leather, and metal products worth UGX 2.5 billion annually. This acts as an import substitution strategy, yielding benefits such as foreign exchange savings and job creation. Additionally, 2,000 metric tons of maize seeds, valued at UGX 10.5 billion annually, are produced, providing quality seeds to farmers and eliminating adulterated seeds from the market.

Under another directive, 610 metric tons of cotton, valued at UGX 0.9 billion, are produced per year, supporting the development of the local textile industry. With the visionary leadership of H.E. Gen. Yoweri Kaguta Museveni, President of the Republic of Uganda, the Uganda Prison Service continues to set a regional benchmark for correctional services, effectively balancing security, production, rehabilitation, and economic contributions to deliver benefits for all Ugandans.


The Prisons Academy and Training School (PATS) in Luzira was a beehive of activities as General David Muhoozi, Minister of State for Internal Affairs, presided over the pass-out ceremony of 60 senior prison officers who successfully completed the 3rd Prisons Intermediate Command and Staff Course (ICSC). The event, held on June 3, 2025, marked a milestone in the Uganda Prisons Service's (UPS) ongoing transformation into a modern, rehabilitative, and productive institution.

he ceremony, attended by dignitaries including Inspector General of Police Abbas Byakagaba, the Deputy IGG Dr. Patricia Achan Okiria, Brigadier General Alex Opolot Olupot representing the Chief of Defence Forces, scholars from Uganda Management Institute and Makerere University, and officials, showcased the service's commitment to professional development. Families of the graduands added warmth to the occasion, celebrating the officers' achievements. Muhoozi, welcomed with a street guard parade, was guided through the training school by Deputy Commissioner General of Prisons (DCGP) Samuel Akena, who highlighted a command post and terrain model demonstration crafted by the graduands.

In his address, Gen. Muhoozi praised UPS for its contributions to national development through the production of cotton, maize seed, quality furniture, and apparel for both the service and other agencies.

He lauded the Commissioner General of Prisons for strategic leadership and urged the graduands to embody professionalism, discipline, and patriotism. "Be leaders with a difference," he said, encouraging continuous learning and career advancement. He also commended UPS's low recidivism rates, crediting vocational skilling and formal education programs, and pledged the Ministry's support for ongoing infrastructure improvements, including staff housing and prisoner wards constructed by the Prisons Engineering Gang.

DCGP Samuel Akena, speaking on behalf of the Commissioner General, outlined UPS's strategic priorities amid challenges like an 8% annual increase in prisoner numbers—far outpacing the national population growth of 2.9%. With 79,000 inmates against a capacity of 22,000, congestion remains a pressing issue. Akena called for government support to address the staff-to-prisoner ratio and announced plans to recruit 2,000 staff annually.



He highlighted infrastructure progress, including 1,812 completed staff housing units and 317 more under construction in Luzira, Masaka, and other regions, alongside 19 new prisoner wards and 20 more planned.

Akena President also revealed Yoweri Museveni's approval of the Integrated Prison Industries Project, focusing on tannery, footwear, furniture, textiles, and garments to boost local production and reduce importation costs. This aligns with the "Buy Uganda, Build Uganda" initiative and UPS's underscores role in socio-economic transformation.

Ms. Mary Centenary, Assistant Commissioner of Prisons and Acting Commandant of emphasized the ICSC's role in advancina correctional leadership. "This training equips officers with intellectual and practical approaches to meet the service's correctional needs," she said. "It produces middle-level senior officers capable of efficiently managing prison units while contributing to the national agenda." Addressing the graduands, she quoted President John F. Kennedy: "Leadership and learning are indispensable to each other." She urged them to maintain resilience, discipline, and a commitment to lifelong learning, adding, "As managers, you shape what UPS is now and what it will be in the future. Be the leaders you wish you had, and success will follow."

The ICSC, a pillar of UPS's human capital development, equips middle-level managers with skills in institutional leadership, problem-solving, and human rights, delivered through partnerships with Uganda Management Institute, Makerere University, and agencies like the Uganda People's Defence Forces and Financial Intelligence Authority. The course includes certifications in Institutional Management, Administrative Law, and Peace Building, alongside field visits to national installations to broaden officers' perspectives on security and development.

As the ceremony closed, the 60 graduands stood as symbols of UPS's evolution from a punitive to a correctional philosophy. With initiatives like remission, community corrections, and ICT integration, coupled with a focus on rehabilitation and staff welfare, UPS is poised to lead in correctional services while contributing to Uganda's national development. The graduands, equipped to manage prison units and mentor others, embody the service's vision of professionalism, integrity, and progress.

The Uganda Prisons Service, alongside the Uganda People's Defence Forces (UPDF) and Uganda Police Force, united with the faithful at the Uganda Catholic Martyrs Shrine in Namugongo to commemorate the third day of the Patron Saint Day.

This annual celebration, held from May 25 to June 2 annually, honors the courage and faith of the Uganda Martyrs, who stood as pillars of strength amid persecution between 1885 and 1887.

Under the theme "Oh, Lord, Let me see again; I, Your Pilgrim of Hope," derived from Mark 10:51, the day's events spotlighted three revered martyrs: St. Ponsiano Ngondwe, St. Gonzaga Gonza, and St. Bruno Sserunkuuma. These saints, among the 45 young men executed under King Mwanga II of Buganda for refusing to renounce their Christian faith, were celebrated for their extraordinary lives and sacrifices.

The day began at 5:00 PM with a spirited procession from Naalya, a few kilometers from the shrine, led by Mr. Samuel Akena, Deputy Commissioner General of Prisons, and the Uganda Prisons Band. Prison Officers marched with precision, pride, and uniformity, drawing crowds along the route as businesses paused to witness this display of discipline and devotion.

Upon arriving at the Namugongo Shrine, a Mass commenced, filled with songs of worship and praise led by the Church Choir and the Prisons Band.

The Chief Pilgrim, the Inspector General of Police, was represented by AIGP Hadija Namutebi, Director of Welfare, Production, and Sports. She led a team of senior and junior police officers, joining their counterparts from the Uganda Prisons Service in filling the shrine, showcasing unity and inter agency collaboration in the house of the Lord.

Father Paul Ssekayala, Parish Priest of Kamuli Kireka Parish, Kampala Diocese, delivered a powerful sermon emphasizing obedience, faith, and compassion. He urged the congregation to emulate the martyrs' resilience, saying, "The martyrs tasted the world we are in today and showed us how to strengthen our spirits." He also cautioned against immorality, including fornication, lust, excessive drinking of Alcohol and illegal marriages.







Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) joined correctional leaders from 36 African nations at the 7th Biennial Conference of the African Correctional Services Association (ACSA), held from May 12 to 16, 2025, at the Tamesna local prison near Rabat, Morocco. Themed "Advancing Technology in the Management of Prison Systems in Africa: A Critical Objective," the conference provided a vital platform for sharing innovative solutions to modernize correctional systems across the continent.

he event was officially opened by Morocco's Minister of Economy and Finance, Hon. Nadia Fettah Alaoui, representing the Head of Government. She praised Senegal for hosting the 6th Biennial Conference in Dakar in 2023 and emphasized Morocco's commitment to ACSA's mission of fostering South-South cooperation. "Digital transformation and e-governance are key to enhancing prison security, reducing overcrowding, and combating transnational crime," Hon. Alaoui stated, underscoring the conference's role in sustainable exchanging best practices for correctional reform.

Leading the Ugandan delegation was Dr. George Muge, Assistant Commissioner General of Prisons (Director Cooperation and Corporate Affairs), joined by Mr. Akankunda Apollo, Commissioner of Prisons (National, Regional, and International Cooperation); Mr. Elubu Francis Xevior, Assistant Commissioner of Prisons (RPC - Kampala Extra Region); Ms. Juliet

(Quality Master General); Dr. Onesmus Bitaliwo, Senior Superintendent of Prisons (Human Resource Planning and Development); Dr. Aida Ajambo, Prisons Health Services; and Mr. Ojiambo A. Paul, Principal Officer I (Incharge Protocol).

The conference, hosted by Morocco's General Administration Delegation for Prison Reintegration (DGAPR), focused on leveraging technology to address pressing challenges in African correctional systems. Mohamed Salah Tamek, head of DGAPR, highlighted Morocco's readiness to share its training infrastructure and expertise with African counterparts, advocating for a permanent ACSA headquarters to enhance coordination. resolutions included promoting technological innovation, sustainable agricultural practices like smart farming, and vocational training for inmate reintegration.

For UPS, participation in the conference aligns with its ongoing transformation from a punitive to a rehabilitative correctional model. The delegation's

exposure to advanced technologies, such as digital inmate management systems and e-governance tools, offers practical solutions to streamline operations, bolster security, and enhance rehabilitation programs. With Uganda's prison population growing at 8% annually against a capacity of 22,000 for 79,000 inmates, these innovations are critical to addressing overcrowding and improving inmate welfare.

Dr. George Muge emphasized the value of regional collaboration, noting that insights from other African nations will inform UPS's strategies for staff training and infrastructure development. "This platform allows us to learn from continental best practices and contribute to a shared vision of humane and effective correctional systems," he said. The conference also strengthens Uganda's capacity to tackle cross-border crime through partnerships with agencies like the African Union and the International Corrections and Prisons Association (ICPA).

The event builds on UPS's recent achievements, including the graduation of 60 senior officers from the Intermediate Command and Staff Course (ICSC) at the Prisons Academy and Training School in Luzira. As Ms. Mary Centenary, Acting Commandant of PATS, noted during the ceremony,

such training equips officers to manage prison units efficiently while contributing to national development. The ACSA conference complements these efforts by providing a continental perspective on professionalizing correctional services.

South Africa's election as ACSA's new Chairperson, with National Commissioner Makgothi Samuel Thobakgale at the helm, was a highlight of the conference. South Africa will host the 8th Biennial Conference in 2027, following Zambia's Ministerial Consultative Forum in 2026. These milestones signal a renewed commitment to correctional reform across Africa, with UPS poised to play a pivotal role. By aligning with global standards like the Nelson Mandela Rules, UPS aims to build secure, humane, and rehabilitative prisons that contribute to Uganda's socio-economic transformation and continental unity.

The event, marked by thanksgiving prayers led by Fr. Joseph Sentomero of St. Bruno Catholic Church, brought together prison staff, inmates, former prison officers, and members of the Family of Africa, a civil society organization founded by Fr. Scianname.

s. Stella Nabunya, Commissioner of Prisons (Health Services), represented the Commissioner General of Prisons at the event and expressed deep gratitude for the opportunity to honor Fr. Scianname.

Ms. Salome Atoo Stella, Superintendent of Prisons (Officer in Charge of Luzira Women's Prison), warmly welcomed attendees and described the occasion as a "special moment to reflect on the extraordinary legacy of Fr. Felice Scianname."

Who Was Fr. Felice Scianname?

Fr. Felice Scianname was an Italian Catholic priest and the founder of the Family of Africa, a civil society organization dedicated to supporting marginalized communities in Uganda. Known for his compassion and commitment to social justice, he worked extensively with the Uganda Prisons Service, particularly at Luzira Women's Prison, between 2001 and 2024. Described as a selfless and visionary

leader, Fr. Scianname's mission was to uplift the disadvantaged, particularly inmates, their children, and orphans, through education, healthcare, and spiritual guidance.

During his time in Uganda, Fr. Scianname led groundbreaking initiatives that transformed Luzira Women's Prison. His organization, in partnership with the UPS, constructed a daycare education section within the prison, enabling children of incarcerated mothers to access elementary education. This facility provided a safe learning environment, ensuring these children were not denied their right to education due to their parents' circumstances. Additionally, Fr. Scianname spearheaded the establishment of a maternity ward at the prison, equipped with a labor room, medical facilities, and space for over 30 mothers.

Beyond the prison, Fr. Scianname's Family of Africa operated an orphanage at Comboni House in Luzira, caring for approximately 100 orphans who attended primary school and later transitioned to secondary education at St. John's Boarding Secondary School in Mukono. His holistic approach provided vulnerable children, including those abandoned due to their parents' incarceration, with opportunities to thrive.

The event reflected Fr. Scianname's enduring influence, with former prison officers, who worked alongside the priest during his time at Luzira, returning to join the celebration. The atmosphere was filled with music, prayer, and shared memories, as attendees recounted how Fr. Scianname's compassionz touched their lives. Inmates at Luzira Women's Prison, many of whom benefited from the educational and maternal facilities he established, participated in the prayers with gratitude.

Fr. Joseph Sentomero, leading the thanksgiving prayers, reflected on Fr. Scianname's selflessness and dedication. "He saw the humanity in everyone, especially those society often forgets. His legacy lives on in the lives he transformed and the institutions he built," he said.

The Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) played an important role in ensuring the safety and security of millions of pilgrims who gathered at the Namugongo Catholic and Anglican Shrines, Nakiyanja, and Mamre Prayer Centre for the annual Uganda Martyrs' Day celebrations. Commemorating the 45 Catholic and Anglican martyrs executed between 1885 and 1887 for their Christian faith, the event drew faithful from across Uganda and beyond, with the Uganda Prisons Service joining a robust joint security task force to maintain peace and order.

s part of the multi-layered security strategy coordinated by the Joint Operations Committee (JOC), UPS deployed personnel to reinforce critical security operations, including access control, searches, crowd management, and patrols. Their contributions were instrumental in creating a safe environment for the estimated 4 million pilgrims who attended the vibrant liturgical celebrations, themed "Oh Lord, Let Me See Again" (Mark 10:51), led by the Lugazi Catholic Diocese.

Prison Officers worked alongside the Uganda People's Defence Forces (UPDF), Uganda Police Force (UPF), Special Forces Command (SFC), and other security agencies to secure the holy sites. The officers were strategically positioned at entry points to conduct thorough searches, manage the

flow of pilgrims, and prevent potential disruptions. Foot and motorized patrols, supported by the Prisons Service, ensured constant vigilance across the venues and surrounding areas, including routes used by pilgrims trekking from regions like Lira, Nebbi, and international destinations such as Kenya, Tanzania, and Rwanda.

Mr. Simon Ben Wansadha, Commissioner of Prisons (Safety, Security and Operations) praised the officers' efforts, emphasizing that securing the holy ground and ensuring participant safety were top priorities. Despite no credible threats being identified, vigilance was crucial given the global context of attacks on religious gatherings.

Mr. Xavier Francis Elubu, Assistant Commissioner of Prisons (RPC – KER) lauded the officers' commitment, highlighting their role in





managing crowds, reuniting lost children, and supporting surveillance efforts with drones and CCTV. These efforts created a calm environment, appreciated by pilgrims and vendors alike. UPS personnel played a vital role in crowd control, managing the large influx of pilgrims and preventing overcrowding, particularly along the Namugongo-Kyaliwajjala Road.

The UPS also contributed to the successful reunification of 29 out of 38 missing children during the 2024 celebrations, with ongoing efforts to locate remaining nine. Mr. Jack Kwihangana, the Superintendent of Prisons (Officer in Charge of the Safety and Security Unit), emphasized the invaluable role of prison officers in the command center at Namugongo, where they provided critical intelligence sharing and on-the-ground support to coordinated security operations. UPS's involvement complemented advanced surveillance measures, such as CCTV cameras, drones, and aerial monitoring by the Police Airwing and UPDF, ensuring comprehensive coverage of the event.

Pilgrims expressed gratitude for the secure environment, with many noting the professionalism of the joint security forces. "I felt safe walking from Mukono to Namugongo, knowing security was present at every step," said Maria Nansubuga, a pilgrim from Lugazi Diocese. Vendors like Rebecca Nakintu, who sold religious memorabilia outside the Catholic shrine, also benefited from the orderly atmosphere, reporting brisk sales amid the peaceful celebrations.



Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) made an impact at the 2025 International Trade Exhibition on Agriculture and Equipment, held at the UMA Show Grounds in Lugogo from May 15 to 17, 2025. The event, a platform for agricultural and industrial innovation, saw UPS captivate attendees with an impressive display of high-quality products.

PS exhibited a wide array of items, including maize and soybean seeds, furniture, leather and artisan products, flags, liquid soap, and apparel. These offerings highlighted the organization's strides in agricultural transformation and the revitalization of prison industries through vocational skilling programs. The UPS stall became a focal point for visitors, who were eager to explore it's innovative contributions to Uganda's socio-economic development.

The showcased products underscored UPS' commitment to fostering self-sustainability and empowering inmates through skills development. Visitors engaged with UPS representatives, gaining insights into how these initiatives were driving positive change within the prison system and beyond. The exhibition provided a platform for UPS to demonstrate its role in Uganda's broader agricultural and industrial landscape, leaving a lasting impression on attendees.

MENTAL HEALTH IN UGANDA'S PRISONS: A VITAL INVESTMENT IN JUSTICE AND REHABILITATION



ncarceration in Uganda continues to be linked to significant mental health challenges. Many prisoners endure psychological distress due to trauma, legal uncertainty, and separation from families. Historically, mental health care in the Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) was underfunded and underdeveloped. Today, however, UPS is intentionally prioritizing mental health as a core aspect of inmate care and rehabilitation.

Uganda Prisons Services

A recent mental health assessment across Jinja, Mbale, and Soroti women's prisons revealed that 54.7 percent of women inmates screened had a diagnosable mental health condition. Disorders such as Generalized Anxiety Disorder (41 percent), panic disorder (29.8 percent), and depression (21.7 percent) were most common. The highest burden was among women on committal status—those awaiting trial for extended periods—where 74.4 percent had a mental illness. Many struggled with trauma, grief, stigma, and legal uncertainty.

In response, UPS has deployed psychiatric clinical officers and nurses to regional health units in prisons such as Luzira, Mbarara, and Gulu. Inmates are now routinely screened using tools like PHQ-9 and GAD-7, and referrals are made to Butabika National Referral Mental Hospital or regional psychiatric centers when advanced care is needed. Treatment includes medication, counselling, and psychosocial support, though adherence remains a challenge—particularly due to side effects, stigma, prison transfers, and inconsistent medication supplies. In a recent study, nearly 37 percent of those

prescribed psychiatric medication discontinued it.

Transfers and releases further complicate care. Many inmates are moved or discharged without continuity of treatment. UPS is calling for a coordinated inter-facility referral protocol and pre-release planning to ensure inmates are linked to community mental health services upon release.

Mental health services in UPS are also tied to justice. Prison psychiatrists conduct forensic assessments, help courts determine inmates' mental fitness to stand trial, and offer expert testimony under the Mental Health Act of 2018, which guarantees the rights of people with mental illness. To meet growing demand, UPS and Butabika are working to establish a forensic psychiatric unit within the hospital grounds. This facility will provide secure inpatient care for mentally ill offenders, support forensic assessments, and serve as a training and research hub.

Beyond clinical care, UPS also supports psychosocial and spiritual rehabilitation. Programs like StrongMinds offer group therapy for depression, while organizations like Penal Reform International and Prison Fellowship Uganda contribute to healing and behavioral change through faith-based interventions. Many inmates report improved coping and reduced distress through these programs.


UPS is also training correctional officers to recognize signs of mental distress and respond appropriately. Mental health is now part of routine officer education, helping to foster a trauma informed approach within the prison environment.

Finally, mental health services are being integrated with reintegration support. As inmates approach release, many experience anxiety and fear about returning to society. UPS is working with partners to provide post-release support—though more coordination is needed with local governments, NGOs, and health centers to ensure continuity of care.

In all these efforts, one principle is clear: mental health care in prisons is both a public health priority and a justice issue. UPS is moving towards a system that offers not just custody, but care—one that recognizes mental illness as treatable, not criminal.

With sustained investment and reform, Uganda can build a correctional system that protects the public while giving every inmate a fair chance to heal, recover, and reintegrate into society.

UPS SPORTS HEALTH SECTION RISES TO TACKLE INJURY AND PERFORMANCE CHALLENGES



For years, sports teams within the Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) faced a pressing but often overlooked challenge—a surge in sports-related injuries, minimal medical oversight during training and matches, and limited systems for athlete recovery. Despite the Service's stellar representation in national competitions, athletes lacked the structured health support necessary to sustain peak performance.

n response, UPS established a dedicated Sports Health Section, headquartered in Luzira and led by Dr. Charles Kajoba Kimuli, with a clear mission: to provide professional, consistent, and athlete-centered medical care across all UPS sports disciplines.

Today, each of UPS's competitive clubs—in cluding the Maroons and She Maroons Football Clubs, Netball, Handball, Volleyball, Woodball, Darts, Taekwondo, and Athletics Clubs—has a qualified team doctor assigned. These medical professionals are present at every training session and match day, providing immediate care, overseeing long-term rehabilitation, and guiding players through structured fitness and recovery programs.

"Our athletes are no longer playing through pain or guessing their recovery timelines. We've built a system that prioritizes their health without compromising performance," said Dr. Kimuli.


A SHIFT TO PREVENTIVE SPORTS CARE

One of the most transformative approaches introduced by the section is preventive health monitoring. Before joining regular team activities, athletes undergo pre-participation evaluations, and are continuously monitored for overuse injuries, muscular imbalances, and signs of fatigue.

High-impact disciplines like handball, football, and taekwondo now benefit from specialized physiotherapy sessions, taping techniques, and musculoskeletal screenings aimed at reducing the risk of major injuries.

MEDICAL PRESENCE ON THE FRONTLINES

During competitive fixtures, UPS sports medical teams are fully equipped with mobile medical kits, trauma supplies, and on-the-spot diagnostic tools. From minor sprains to match-day emergencies, athletes receive immediate professional care, drastically reducing long-term downtimes.



Post-match, players are evaluated for muscle strain, hydration status, and emerging conditions. Recovery protocols—including guided stretching, ice therapy, and rest planning—are tailored to each athlete's condition.

HEALTH EDUCATION AND AWARENESS

Education is a core pillar of the Sports Health Section. Athletes receive regular guidance on nutrition, hydration, mental wellness, injury reporting, and safe training practices. Coaches, too, are engaged through workshops to enhance their understanding of basic sports medicine and early signs of distress among players.

MEASURABLE SUCCESS

Since the establishment of the Sports Health Section:

- * Injury-related absenteeism has reduced by over 60% across all clubs.
- * UPS Maroons and She Maroons Football Clubs have completed full seasons without a single long-term injury.
- * The Netball and Handball Clubs have seen improved player consistency and match fitness.
- * UPS Athletics Club recorded its best national competition performance in three years, credited largely to improved injury management and conditioning.

"The results speak for themselves. Healthy athletes mean stronger teams, and stronger teams represent the Uganda Prisons Service with pride and resilience," Dr. Kimuli affirmed.

PRISONS QUEENS CLAIM BRONZE AT THE 2025 EAST AFRICAN NETBALL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP IN ZANZIBAR, TANZANIA – MAY 20, 2025

Uganda Prisons Netball Club, the reigning Uganda Netball Super League champions, delivered a statement of intent at the 2025 East African Netball Club Championship, securing a well-deserved third-place finish after a thrilling campaign at the state-of-the-art Amaan Indoor Stadium in Zanzibar.

Despite falling agonisingly short in a tense semi-final against KCCA, Prisons bounced back with characteristic resolve, dispatching Zanzibar's KVZ 67-41 in the third-place playoff. The tournament, held from May 12 to May 20, showcased Prisons' depth, discipline, and dominance, cementing their status as one of East Africa's elite netball sides.

Arriving in Zanzibar on May 11 aboard the Azam Zan Fast Ferries, the Queens were on a mission to upgrade from back-to-back silver medals in 2023 and 2024. Led by Head of Delegation PRRO David Moses Okiring, ASP Florence Amono (Team Manager), Head Coach Elnouredine Kato Hassan, Assistant Coach/Defender Lillian Ajio, Team Doctor Beatrice Rwegyema, and Media Officer Fred Akena, the team was a blend of experience and youthful promise.

Skippered by prolific shooter Christine Kango Namulumba and anchored by defensive wall Lillian Ajio, the roster also featured veterans Sylvia Nanyonga, Dorothy Tabia, and rising stars like teenage debutants Joan Reykoboth, Sharon Pita, and Nashim Khadaala.

Drawn in Group B, Prisons stormed through the group stage unbeaten, claiming emphatic wins over Jeshi Stars (55–39), Magereza (79–24), Mafunzo (73–35), KVZ (73–43), and APR (79–30). The Queens combined speed and tactical discipline, with Namulumba netting 153 goals in five games and Reykoboth excelling in mid-court orchestration.

Coach Hassan praised the team's balance: "Every player contributed. Our young talents showed maturity beyond their years. This depth is what makes us a threat."

In a semi-final showdown that had fans on the edge of their seats, Prisons narrowly lost 44–43 to fellow Ugandans KCCA. Leading by two in the final minute, a late surge from KCCA, capped by a last–second goal, snatched victory from the Luzira–based side. Defender Sharon Pita's injury and late game changes proved pivotal in a match that could have gone either way.

"It was painful," admitted Coach Hassan. "But it reminded us what we're made of. We picked ourselves up."


Determined to finish strong, Prisons faced KVZ again in the third-place playoff on May 20. Namulumba's clinical finishing, Ajio's impeccable marking, and fluid mid-court transitions saw the Queens dismantle the home team 67-41. The result was a resounding response to the semi-final loss and a celebration of the team's resilience.

Ajio was named Best Defender of the Tournament, while Namulumba took home the Top Scorer Award with 153 goals.

Returning to Uganda, Prisons Queens resumed Super League duties with a 70–22 demolition of Luweero on May 31, even in the absence of key players recovering from Zanzibar injuries. The performance highlighted the team's squad depth, with youngsters like Kenema Margret and Winny Florence Anyait stepping up.

All eyes are now on the June 14 Super League blockbuster rematch against KCCA at Nakivubo Outdoor Stadium. The Queens will be seeking redemption and revenge.

"Zanzibar taught us resilience," Coach Hassan reflected. "Now we regroup. The next chapter begins with KCCA—and we are ready."




FINAL STANDINGS - 2025 EAST AFRICAN NETBALL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP (Women's)

RISING STAR: 17-YEAR-OLD JOAN REYKOBOTH SHINES ON HER DEBUT AT THE 2025 EAST AFRICAN NETBALL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

At just 17 years old, Joan Reykoboth announced her arrival on the regional netball stage in spectacular fashion during the 2025 East African Netball Club Championship in Zanzibar. Making her senior debut for the Uganda Prisons Netball Club—popularly known as the Prisons Queens—Reykoboth played with maturity, vision, and confidence far beyond her years, quickly becoming one of the tournament's standout performers in the mid-court.

eykoboth, a product of St. Mary SS Kitende, youth development program, was named in the traveling squad for the prestigious regional tournament and immediately justified her selection. Cool under pressure, intelligent in distribution, and relentless in tracking opponents, she slotted seamlessly into the Queens' setup, earning praise from both fans and technical staff.

Commanding the Mid-Court

Deployed primarily as Centre (C) and Wing Attack (WA), Reykoboth demonstrated exceptional footwork, quick decision-making, and crisp passing, linking the defensive unit with the lethal shooting pair of Christine Namulumba and Dorothy Tabia. Her partnership with experienced mid-courters like Joyce Nakibuule proved electric, particularly in matches against Jeshi Stars, Mafunzo, and KVZ, where her court awareness and calm ball control dictated the pace of the game.

In the 55-39 group opener against Jeshi Stars, Reykoboth was introduced immediately changed the momentum. Her feeds into the circle were precise, and her transitions in recovery defense helped swing the tide in Prisons' favour. From that point forward, she became a fixture in Coach Elnouredine Kato Hassan's rotations.

Coach's Confidence

"Joan is a rare talent," said Coach Hassan. "She listens, learns, and plays with heart. At 17, to dominate the mid-court the way she did in a tournament of this magnitude—against regional champions—is something special. We knew she had potential, but Zanzibar has shown us she's ready for top-flight netball."

Her most iconic moment came during the high-stakes semi-final against KCCA. With Prisons leading narrowly, Reykoboth intercepted a key pass in the second quarter, sparking a fast break that led to a goal—eliciting roars from the Amaan Stadium

In the bronze medal match against KVZ, she once again orchestrated the mid-court play, helping Prisons to a dominant 67-41 win and securing their place on the podium.

Future of Prisons Queens and Uganda Netball

Joan Reykoboth's performances in Zanzibar have not only solidified her place in the Prisons Queens senior team but also positioned her as one of Uganda's most exciting young prospects. Her story is a testament to the success of Uganda Prisons' investment in youth development and the nurturing of homegrown talent.

With the domestic Super League continuing and the national selectors watching closely, it may not be long before Joan dons the national colors.

"She is the future," said veteran teammate Lillian Ajio.

UGANDA'S RELAY TEAM SMASHES NATIONAL RECORD, ADOLI SHINES AT KIP KEINO CLASSIC



Uganda's athletics scene is buzzing with pride as the 4x400m mixed relay team and sprinter Haron Adoli deliver stellar performances on the global stage, setting the tone for an exciting 2025 season.

At the World Athletics Relays in Guangzhou, China, Uganda's mixed relay quartet—Haron Adoli and Godfrey Chanwengo from Uganda Prisons Service, alongside Shida Leni and Maureen Banura from Uganda Police Force—made history by shattering the national record. Clocking an impressive 3:15.26 (officially recorded as 3:16.59), the team finished fifth in a fiercely competitive heat behind Belgium, Australia, Kenya, and Italy. Ranked 17th globally, the squad now gears up for a crucial repechage round, aiming to secure a spot at the World Athletics Championships in Tokyo later this year.

Adoli, a standout in the relay, carried his momentum to the Kip Keino Classic Continental Tour 2025 in Nairobi, Kenya, where he obliterated his personal best in the men's 400m. Storming to a stunning 45.21 seconds, Adoli showcased his growing prowess, finishing fourth in a star-studded field. South Africa's Nene Zakithi claimed victory with a world-leading 43.76, followed by Nigeria's Chidi Okezie with a season's best of 44.98, and Kenya's Zablon Ekwam Ekwal at 45.01.

"Haron's performance in Nairobi is a testament to his hard work and the rising standard of Ugandan athletics," said Uganda Athletics Federation (UAF) president Dominic Otuchet. "The relay team's record-breaking run in Guangzhou further proves we're on the right track."

Back home, the athletics calendar is heating up with the Akii-Bua Memorial Championship and Invitational Meet, scheduled for June 1 and June 7, 2025, at Mandela National Stadium, Namboole. Organized as part of Uganda's centenary athletics celebrations under the theme "Celebrating and Sustaining Athletics Excellence," the events will see Prisons Athletics Club, a powerhouse in Ugandan athletics, vie for top honors. With Adoli and Chanwengo leading the charge, expectations are high for a dominant showing.

As Uganda's athletes continue to break barriers, the nation eagerly awaits their next feats, both at home and abroad.

PRISONS VOLLEYBALL CLUB JUNIOR TEAM MISSES SERIE A QUALIFICATION AFTER FALLING TO KUVC IN NSAMBYA

The Prisons Volleyball Club junior team, which is part of the recently relegated senior squad, fell short of qualifying for the Serie A elite league after a gripping 3–2 loss to Kampala University Volleyball Club (KUVC) at Nsambya. The return leg defeat, following a 3–2 loss in the first leg, handed KUVC qualification on sporting merit, leaving both the junior and senior components of Prisons to regroup and focus on another shot at Serie A.

he return leg in Nsambya was a five-set thriller. Prisons opened strongly, clinching the first set 25-20, with setter Charles Lwanga delivering precise setups and centres William Imuta and Trevor Okalang dominating at the net. KUVC struck back in the second set, overwhelming Prisons 25-11 to level the match.

Prisons edged it 25–23. KUVC responded in the fourth, leveraging strong serves and blocks to win 25–23, forcing a fifth set. Opposite Alfred Odongo powered Prisons with aggressive hits, but KUVC held firm, taking the set 15–13 and the match 3–2. With a 3–2 win in the first leg, KUVC secured their place in the Serie A elite league.

Prisons fielded a determined squad:

Charles Lwanga (Setter): Orchestrated plays with precision to fuel the attack.

William Imuta & Trevor Okalang (Centres): Controlled the net with blocks and powerful hits.

Lazarus Omuna & Daniel Naukoth (Receiver Attackers): Delivered key spikes in critical moments.

The club remains determined to regroup, refine their game, and make a strong case for promotion. The squad's resilience, evident in the tight sets and standout performances from players like Lwanga, Odongo, and Obwang, offers hope for a comeback. PRISONS HANDBALL CLUB NAVIGATES HIGHS AND LOWS IN NATIONAL HANDBALL LEAGUE



Prisons Handball Club (HC) showcased resilience in the National Handball League, enduring a narrow 39–42 defeat to UPDF HC before rebounding with a commanding 45–39 victory over Makerere University on June 3, 2025, at Old Kampala Arena. 2nd Place Overall in the fiercely contested tournament.


