UNODC CONSULTATIVE MEETING WITH UPS MANAGEMENT



UNODC- Head of Office Uganda and Commisioner of Prisons (Safety and Security)

The UNDOC and UPS senior management held a consultative meeting on the Prevention and Countering of Violent Extremism in Prisons at the Sheraton Hotel. With the terrorism threat Worldwide, it has become is increasingly evident that the prison environment is a fertile ground for recruitment and radicalization of prisoners detained for different offences into violent extremism.

The consultation meeting between UPS Senior Management and UNODC was to update senior management on the progress of the implementation of the Joint Global Programme in Uganda.

The existing curriculum for training prisons officers in Uganda was developed before the problem of violent extremism was an issue and as such did not cover the subject of violent extremism in the prison context and how prisons officers can prevent and counter such.

The Commissioner General of Prisons - Can. Dr. Johnson Byabashaija and Ms. Vera Tkachenko, the Global Programme Coordinator, Justice Section of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) based at it's headquarters in Vienna, Austria officially launched the publications which have been in development for the past one year between the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime under the Joint Global Programme "Supporting the Management of Violent Extremist Prisoners and the Prevention of Radicalization to Violence in Prisons" with trainers from the Prisons Academy and Training School of the Uganda Prisons Service.

The commissioner General applauded the UNODC for developing tools that will be used in preventing radicalization and reducing the spread of violent extremism in Prisons, he pledged full support in the improvement and implementation of the developed tools focusing on four (4) key major priority areas of security and safety mechanisms in Prisons; Risks and needs assessments of Prisoners; Prisons based disengagement interventions, social rehabilitation and reintegration of offenders.

"Uganda Prisons Service is currently in custody of 102 inmates on terrorism related charges of which nine (9) are convicted and 93 are still undergoing trials", he further revealed.



Ms. Vera Tkachenko, the UNODC global coordinator extended much gratitude to the Uganda Prisons Service top management for the continued partnership in reducing violence in Uganda, "Our major challenges have been congestion in Prisons globally brought about by poor living conditions, case back logs and increase in prison population". She added.

The objective of this initiative by UNODC and UPS is to contribute to strengthening the resilience of prisoners against violent extremism and radicalization while respecting human rights standards.

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TRAINING MAKES PERFECT: CUSTOMER CARE EXTENDED TO MID-CENTRAL REGION.

Commissioner of Prisons (Corporate Affairs) Frank Baine conducted customer care and public relations trainings to Officers in Charge and Senior Officers of Mid-Central Region on the 13th November 2021 at Primerose Hotel in Mubende District.

Following his interraction with team, Mr. Baine highlighted much on the meaning, components of customer care and why it is required in respect to protecting the Prisons brand and it's uniqueness. The officers were also urged to apply professionalism and integrity in handling matters within their jurisdiction since customer care is key in management of Prisoners, staff and general administration of the modern Prisons setttings.

He emphasised much on crisis management, adherance to Prisons Rules and Regulations, positive interpersonal relationships, proper channels of communications, finacial literacy and social responsibility. Encouraging them to work hard to harmonize their families by fulfilling parental roles and responsibilities saying that most of the family roles have been neglected since parents are doing the roles of children and maids are doing the roles of the parents and therefore children are doing nothing and this results into un productive of upcoming generation to the society.

"Always work to achieve the best in your daily duties, respect each other and educate young officers on how they can generate house hold income so that they can grow and develop their families, this will enhance social economic transformation of Ugandans to a middle income society since they are the future genration".

Addressing on the issue of Media, the participants were reminded to keenly observe proper channels of transmitting information compelling them to be conscious and watchful, "Avoid dessemination of un necessary information especially when using social media platforms such as Face book, Twitter, WhatsApp and many more, they are very injurius in regards to the reputation of the service".

On behalf of the officers present, Superintendent of Prisons – Atuzo Walter (District Prisons Commander-Mityana) appreciated Uganda Prisons through it's Public Relations Office for initiating trainings on customer care, public relations, household demography and financial literacy.

UNODC DONATE TO UPS

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC)-Uganda Programme Office on Wednesday 3 November 2021 handed over medical equipment to Uganda Prisons Service (UPS) due to be used at the High Dependency Unit (HDU) at the Staff Treatment Centre at Luzira, this is part of its COVID19 response support to Uganda Prisons Service. The equipment consists of Hospital Oxygen 4-5-way airflow splitters, Oxygen non-rebreathe patient masks and hospital Oxygen regulators as well as coveralls and face shields.

During the hand over at the Kampala Extra Region offices in Luzira, Commissioner of Prisons (Health) John Bosco Tumwebaze expressed much gratitute to the UNODC HIV/AIDS section for providing the funding for the donated equipments.

The UNODC - Head of Office Uganda, Ms. Sharon Lesa Nyambe highlighted that the donation is in addition to what UNODC gave to Uganda Prisons Service during the first wave of COVID19 lockdown that consisted of seven video conferencing equipment to facilitate virtual court hearings and ensured that prisoners continued to access justice which is intended to reduce prison overcrowding.

UNODC also provided phone handsets and airtime to Uganda Prisons Services to be used by prisoners in 16 COVID19 isolation centres to communicate with their relatives and lawyers during lockdown when prison visits were restricted.

This was in addition to hospital beds, mattresses, bed sheets, blankets to support five newly established COVID19 treatment centres in prisons. Another water tanks, mattresses, blankets and cartons of soap were provided to enhance water and sanitation in these regional isolation prisons.

UNODC has also provided sports equipment for prisoner's recreation and development of talents and skills using sporting activities, fuel to transport 4,000 released prisoners to go back to their homes was provided early last year.

PROMOTING HEALTH, TRADE AND FOOD SECURITY IN UPS BY REDUCING THE RISK OF AFLATOXIN IN CROPS

What are aflatoxins?

Aflatoxins are poisonous compounds produced by moulds/fungi which invade improperly dried foods processed from contaminated raw materials of some agricultural crops like maize and soya beans, peanuts, cottonseed, and tree nuts. The main fungi that produce aflatoxins are Aspergillus flavus and Aspergillus parasiticus, which are abundant in warm and humid regions of Uganda.

Commissioner of Prisons (Farms) Andrew Kisitu describes Aflatoxin as a very dangerous producing fungi which can contaminate crops majorly cereals in the field, at time of harvest and during storage.

How are people exposed to aflatoxins?

Mr. Kisitu terms Aflatoxins as toxic and poisonous in nature, "people can be exposed to aflatoxins by eating contaminated plant products (such as maize grain) or by consuming meat or dairy products from animals that ate contaminated feed".



Agricultural workers, inmates and other farmers may be exposed to Aflatoxins by inhaling dust generated during the handling and processing of contaminated crops and feeds.

Which cancers are associated with exposure to aflatoxins?

Exposure to aflatoxins is associated with an increased risk of liver cancer.

Acute toxicity results when someone takes in a high amount of aflatoxins in a very short time. Most common signs and symptoms are: Nausea, Yellowing of skin and sclera (icterus), Itching, Vomiting, Bleeding, Abdominal pain, Lethargy, Edema, Convulsions, Coma and Death

According Mr. Kisitu, Aflatoxins contamination of food stuff commences immediately from the farm where crops are planted, during crop growth and the process is continues through a value chain through harvests until storage.

Major types and metabolism of Aflatoxins?

Aflatoxin B1 is considered the most toxic and is produced by both Aspergillus flavus and Aspergillus parasiticus. Aflatoxin M1 is present in the fermentation broth of Aspergillus parasiticus, but it and aflatoxin M2 are also produced when an infected liver metabolizes aflatoxin B1 and B2.

Aflatoxin B1 and B2 (AFB), produced by Aspergillus flavus and
A. parasiticus

• Aflatoxin G1 and G2 (AFG), produced by some Group II A. flavus and Aspergillus parasiticus

• Aflatoxin M1 (AFM1), metabolite of aflatoxin B1 in humans and animals (exposure in ng levels may come from a mother's milk)

• Aflatoxin M2, metabolite of aflatoxin B2 in milk of cattle fed on contaminated foods

Aflatoxicol (AFL): metabolite produced by breaking down the lactone ring

• Aflatoxin Q1 (AFQ1), major metabolite of AFB1 in in vitro liver preparations of other higher vertebrates

AFM, AFQ, and AFL retain the possibility to become an epoxide. Nevertheless, they appear much less capable of causing mutagenesis than the unmetabolized toxin.





💽 Mr. Kisitu highlighted that the Uganda Prisons farm department has

continued to adopt key farming methodologies and practices that have been implemented in major cereals growing farm Prisons country such as Lugore, Isimba, Oromtikao, Ragem, Mubuku, Amita among others and they include:

-Agricultural Mechanisation.

•Timely harvests to minimize damage of crop products as soon as they are ready.

•Control of pests such as rodents and insects using recommended storage pesticides and mechanisms

•Proper drainage control and water management through irrigation practices.

•Proper shelling of seeds in the field of planting and further drying the grains.

•Timely land preparations and planting of crops majorly in rows

- •Crop disease control using approved chemicals.
- •Proper storage and post harvest handling

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IMPROVED LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION AND PRODUCTIVITY IN UPS

The livestock industry is a proven venture and a source of food which has been considered a survival enterprise for a thousands of staff and inamtes within the Uganda Prisons Service especially during the Christmas season where cattle are slaughtered majorly for staff and inamtes consumption. Not only targeting food production, it has also become gainful source of employment for veterinary professionals.

Over the years, Uganda Prisons Service has met the ever-increasing demands of it's staff and the general public by improving on the quality of livestock products.

Commissioner of Prisons (Farms) - Kisitu stretched that the effect of seasonality on livestock production in Uganda Prisons Service is very important because during rainy seasons, the forge biomass is higher in quality and quantity with crude protein up to 9 percent in most of the native grasses while during dry seasons the protein level drops and roughage quantity increases.



UPS majorly produces Boran cattle breeds for beef, freshians for milk production and other small ruminants like sheep and goats of both local and exotic breeds.

Through aid from different stakeholders, "We have managed to establish different livestock projects in three categories namely: the beef fattening project, Dairy Project majorly for milk production and small ruminants, the beef cattle act as a source of food and income mean while the dairy project provide milk for which act as supplements for breastfeeding mothers, staff and inmates living with HIV", he said.

Over 200 heads of cattle are slaughtered every year for consumption of Uganda Prisons Staff and inmates country wide due to its enrichment in Proteins

The demand and usefulness of animal products for human health and survival, economic and industrial growth as well as provision of other social services are ever increasing.

According to Mr. Kisitu, Some strategies for purposeful development of the livestock industry (animal production) in the Uganda Prisons Service are suggested as follows:

(1) Careful selection of local breeding stock from breed and individual records.

(2) National upgrading and breeding programs involving exotic and local breeds even in urban farming, thereby mass producing the heterzygous offspring for production purposes.

(3) Careful exploration of various farming systems even in the subsistence farming system to ensure availability of feed-stuff throughout the year and intensification agricultural production system

(4) Feed quality improvement through deliberate supplementation and range exploitation to meet daily requirements for various nutrients.

(5) Exploitation of the biological abilities of the stock to derive maximally from the availability feed-stuff in agribusiness .

(6) Establishment of a responsive and resilient animal health system on agri that is capable of quick intervention, continuous and effective management of animal diseases and their predisposing agents and condition to enable us achieve a sustainable Agriculture.





LUMPY SPRAY AT LOGORE PRISON FARM:

A modern disease control unit for alleviation of tick borne diseases has been contructed, the holding ground is able to house atleast 250 animals and be used for practical illustrations to farmers on how to mix and apply acaricides.

UGANDA PRISONS INDUSTRIES

Prisons Industries provides rehabilitation services to offenders by imparting vocational skills which they gainfully use after release.

It has also offered employment, particularly to long sentence prisoners to occupy them while serving their sentences. In the FY 2020/2021 21,996 inmates enrolled for Industrial Vocational Training activities in 122 prisons country wide of which 20,857 are male inmates and 1,139 females.

Trade testing is done by the Directorate of Industrial Training (DIT) mandated by the Ministry of Education and Sports.

As a result of the activities Non- Tax Revenue (NTR) is realized from the sales of products made.

In the FY 2020/2021, 192.899.601/= NTR was remitted to the Government Consolidated fund. Products are available at the Prisons Showroom located at the Uganda Manufacturers Association (UMS) grounds at Lugogo.
